Exodus 32

Exodus thirty-two is the incredible story that shows just how quickly the sinful heart of man can turn his back on the goodness and graciousness of God. Moses was on Mt. Sinai receiving the tablets of stone, written with the finger of God. The people were below waiting on Moses to return having a word from the God who had delivered them from bondage and brought them to this sacred place to constitute them as a nation. When Moses delayed in his coming, according to their way of thinking, they demanded that Aaron create an image for them to worship. It is an amazing irony that the very first commandment of the covenant God was making with the children of Israel, they were violating before Moses even came down from the mountain of God.

As Moses came back down the mountain, Joshua, his trusted assistant had been waiting for him and immediately said, there is sound of war in the camp. Moses corrected him and said, this is not the sound of war, but rather the sound of singing, which referenced worship. When Moses came near the camp he heard and saw what all the commotion was about and saw the idol or image made likened unto a golden calf, like the gods of Egypt. He became so angry that he threw the tablets down and broke them and took the golden calf and burned it with fire, ground it to pieces; ground it to powder and scattered its ashes on the water and made the people drink it. This gave them a visual of the exceeding sinfulness of their sin. Moses called for judgment on the people and three thousand people lost their lives that day.
