"On the Way" 365 Bible Reading Plan

RUTH 2

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Ruth chapter two follows the narrative that ended chapter one, Naomi returned to her hometown of Bethlehem with her daughter-in-law Ruth, the Moabitess, a foreigner in a land she knew nothing about. Note they came at the beginning of the Barley Harvest. The winter rains had come, and everything was green. It was not spring of the year and the barley, the first crop of the new year, was in full head and ready to harvest. There was an older man in the town of Bethlehem named Boaz and he was very wealthy and owned a lot of land. He was a near relative of Elimelech, the husband of the dead husband of Naomi. Ruth was young and wanted to work and earn her way and take care of her older mother-in-law who had given her a chance for a new beginning in a new land. Naomi sent her to the fields of Boaz and God granted Ruth favor, she must have been beautiful outwardly, but we know she was delightful and winsome because her name means, "Friend" compassion, or in a colloquial sense, someone who can be a merciful friend, not "Ruthless."

After the first day in the fields of Boaz she meets Boaz and finds favor with him. He inquires as to who she is and

meets with her upon finding out she is with Naomi as a widow. Boaz asked her to stay close to the reapers so she can take a full measure to her home that evening and to greet Naomi. She was allowed to drink with his people, and he showed her the kind of favor and blessing that one would only show to someone special. Boaz instructed his harvesters to drop extra sheaves of grain from the gathered bundles so Ruth could have a very good load to take home to Naomi. Ruth was even able to eat with those who belonged to the household of Boaz. Something was happening and it was going to turn out well. As soon as Ruth arrived home and shared the news, Naomi knew God was up to something and began to praise the LORD and gave Ruth instructions concerning the concept of the Kinsman Redeemer in Jewish law.
