JOSHUA 1

Joshua 1

God said to Joshua very plainly, "Moses My servant is dead." Now Joshua had all the responsibility placed squarely on his shoulders and immediately God instructed him, "Arise, go over this Jordan..." Grieving time can be short when it comes to leadership. The leader who leaves or is taken to heaven has finished their course. The people of God can grieve and should, but they cannot stay where the last leader left them, they must fulfill their purpose and conquer the land that is before them. God gives Joshua the coordinates of the land parameters He had promised to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. Those boundaries were and are much larger that the people conquered then and have yet to conquer in their existence. Some would argue that during the days of David and Solomon that was accomplished, but that is highly debatable. One day the people of Israel will conquer all the land, by God's grace and favor.

"From the wilderness and this Lebanon as far as the great river, the River Euphrates, all the land of the Hittites, and to the Great Sea toward the going down of the sun, shall be your territory. No man shall be

able to stand before you all the days of your life; as I was with Moses, so I will be with you. I will not leave you nor forsake you." Joshua 1:4-5
