Esther 9

Esther nine and the short addendum labeled chapter ten are a fitting and glorious conclusion to this wonderful story of God's love, watch care, providence, and blessing to His people Israel. The enemies of the Jews had hoped to overpower and destroy God's chosen race, but instead the opposite happened. Mordecai had been placed in the seat of government as the Prime Minister and had the signet ring of the King to administer the government and this brought great fear upon all the leadership in all the kingdom of the Persians everywhere. Mordecai became a feared hero and his fame and influence continued to grow in all the provinces. The Jewish people instead of being destroyed, were able to destroy all their enemies. There was still however a contingency that hated the Jews who were associated with the government, in the very seat of power in Shushan, the Palace of King Ahasuerus and Queen Esther. Esther wisely asks the King to allow the Jews to deal with those people as well and rid the palace of corruption. The King granted the queen's request.

"Then Mordecai recorded these events, and he sent letters to all the Jews who were in all the provinces of King Ahasuerus, both near and far, obliging them to

celebrate the fourteenth day of the month Adar, and the fifteenth day of the same month, annually, because on those days the Jews rid themselves of their enemies, and it was a month which was turned for them from sorrow into gladness and from mourning into a holiday; that they should make them days of feasting and rejoicing and sending portions of food to one another and gifts to the poor. Thus, the Jews undertook what they had started to do..." (Esther 9:20-23a). Therefore, they called these days Purim after the name of Pur.

...The Jews established and made a custom for themselves and for their descendants and for all those who allied themselves with them, so that they would not fail to celebrate these two days...So, these days were to be remembered and celebrated throughout every generation, every family, every province, and every city; and these days of Purim were not to fail from among the Jews, or their memory fade from their descendants.
