## "On the Way" 365 Bible Reading Plan

## **NEHEMIAH 9**

## Nehemiah 9

Nehemiah nine is the result of what happened in chapter eight. Let's go back to chapter eight to make sure we did not miss the primary teaching of this great event. "He (Ezra) read from it before the square which was in front of the Water Gate from early morning until midday, in the presence of men and women, those who could understand; and all the people were attentive to the book of the law. Ezra the scribe stood at a wooden podium which they had made for the purpose..."

Nehemiah 8:3-4. Ezra read the Law of Moses for hours and the people stood, and not only did they stand there, but they listened. When Ezra stood before them on a "Pulpit" of wood, that is a platform made of wood so he could and would be seen, all the people stood in honor and reverence of the public reading for the sacred scriptures.

A side note, the pulpit of wood was what he stood on and not behind. We often call a pulpit what should be called a podium. The pulpit is the stage or platform, not what a speaker stands behind to speak. When the people stood up, Ezra blessed the LORD, the God of Israel and all the people answered, AMEN! AMEN! and lifted their hands to

God and bowed their heads! The people affirmed the blessing of God by Ezra, and there was response to the reading of the Words of God. This is the pattern of Scripture; the Word of God is read, and the people praise the LORD and worship Him. Verse eight describes what Ezra did in greater detail,

"They read from the book, from the law of God, translating to give the sense so that they understood the reading. Then Nehemiah, who was the governor, and Ezra the priest and scribe, and the Levites who taught the people, said to all the people, 'This day is holy to the LORD your God; do not mourn or weep...' Then he said to them, 'Go, eat of the fat, drink of the sweet, and send portions to him who has nothing prepared; for this day is holy to our Lord. Do not be grieved, for the joy of the LORD is your strength.'" Nehemiah 8:8-10

## **Prayer and Action Steps**

Notice the leaders gave the "sense" of the reading so the people could "understand" the Word of God! Lord, please give us leaders that will help us "understand" your Word, so we can obey. Amen
