EZRA 6

Ezra 6

The people of the land who opposed the work were upset when they could not discourage the people from following the Word of the LORD as proclaimed by the prophets Haggai and Zechariah. They immediately resorted to the legal tactics of writing the King of Persia with a slanted and biased report of the work that the Jews were doing. They requested a search be made in the records of the Persian kings, since the Jews had said that Cyrus the great king of Persia ordered them to build the temple to the God of Israel in Jerusalem. This time the search was made legitimately, and this time Darius found the original decree from Cyrus.

"Moreover, I issue a decree concerning what you are to do for these elders of Judah in the rebuilding of this house of God: the full cost is to be paid to these people from the royal treasury out of the taxes of the provinces beyond the river, and that without delay. Whatever is needed, both young bulls, rams, and lambs for a burnt offering to the God of heaven, and wheat, salt, wine and anointing oil, as the priests in Jerusalem request, it is to be given to them daily without fail, that they may offer acceptable sacrifices to the God of heaven and pray for the life of the king and his sons and I issued a decree that any man who violates this edict, a timber shall be drawn from his house and he shall be impaled on it and his house shall be made a refuse heap on account of this. May the God who has caused His name to dwell there overthrow any king or people who attempts to change it, so as to destroy this house of God in Jerusalem. I, Darius, have issued this decree, let it be carried out with all diligence!" (Ezra 6:8-12)

God honored the Word of His prophets and blessed the work of the people as they built the temple in His name. The temple was finished in 516 B.C. and dedicated to the glory of God with praise, worship, and celebration. This took place exactly seventy years after the first temple had been destroyed.
