"On the Way" 365 Bible Reading Plan

ISAIAH 42

Isaiah 42

Isaiah forty-two is a continuation of encouragement God gives to Israel through His servant Isaiah. Chapter forty-one spoke to God's faithfulness to Israel despite their idol worship and He will judge those who have come against them. God promises to redeem Israel. This redemption will be enacted through the Servant of the LORD, the Messiah as described in chapter forty-two. Israel will be a blessing to God Himself and also the nations of the earth, the gentiles. The first four verses of this chapter are quoted in the New Testament as is much of chapters forty through fifty-five. God promises help and rescue in verses fourteen through twenty, but Israel is still obstinate. God reminds the people in the first part of this chapter that He is not just the God of Israel, but He is the creator of everything and the God of all the peoples of the earth. He knows the end from the beginning.

"God, the LORD, created the heavens and stretched them out. He created the earth and everything in it. He gives breath to everyone, life to everyone who walks the earth. And it is He who says, 'I, the LORD, have called you to demonstrate my righteousness. I will take you by the hand

and guard you, and I will give you to my people, Israel, as a symbol of my covenant with them symbol of my covenant with them. And you will be a light to guide the nations. You will open the eyes of the blind. You will free the captives from prison, releasing those who sit in dark dungeons. I am the LORD; that is my name! I will not give my glory to anyone else, nor share my praise with carved idols. Everything I prophesied has come true, and now I will prophesy again. I will tell you the future before it happens." (vv. 5-9)

God promises He will redeem Israel and will lead them in the way of righteousness. But all those who continue in idolatry will suffer and be kept in bondage. Isaiah foresees the nation going into captivity and laments their hardness and lack of sensitivity to the things of God. God set Israel to be a light to the nations. The promised Messiah, God's true servant would be the personification of God's promises.
