"On the Way" 365 Bible Reading Plan

ISAIAH 49

Isaiah 49

Chapter forty-nine is the continued refrain of God's blessing of Israel and that Israel was created to carry out the blessing of God upon the people of the whole earth. Israel was created to be a blessing to others. God is the God of Israel, yes, but He is the God of the whole earth. Israel was not an end in themselves, but rather a means of blessing to others. This is true of the church and of each person who is a follower of Jesus. Israel would be scattered during the days of the Babylonian exile and would return to their homeland, only to be scattered again. But these prophesies looked to a day when Israel would be back in the land to stay. This is the ultimate fulfillment of these prophesies. Many ask in present day as they did during the days of the first century and the days of the Apostle Paul, "Has God cast His people off?" "Has God forsaken Israel?" "Has God replaced Israel with the Church?" The Apostle Paul answered in Romans 11:1, "I say then, has God cast away His people? Certainly not! For I also am an Israelite, of the seed of Abraham, of the tribe of **Benjamin.**" Look at how God answered Isaiah when even His own people of Zion asked the same question.

"Can a woman forget her nursing child and have no compassion on the son of her womb? Even these may forget, but I will not forget you. Behold, I have inscribed you on the palms of My hands; your walls are continually before Me... Thus says the Lord GOD, behold, I will lift up My hand to the nations and set up My standard to the peoples; and they will bring your sons in their bosom, and your daughters will be carried on their shoulders. Kings will be your guardians, and their princesses your nurses. They will bow down to you with their faces to the earth and lick the dust of your feet; and you will know that I am the LORD; those who hopefully wait for Me will not be put to shame." (Isaiah 49:15-16; 22-23)

God will never forsake Israel and He will never forsake you. The God of Israel is your God and you can trust Him completely.
