"On the Way" 365 Bible Reading Plan

II Kings 2

Elijah goes to heaven in a chariot of fire! WOW! What a fiery finish to Elijah's earthly ministry, part 1. There is so much to write about this miraculous event. First where it happened. The area around Jericho, the lowest city on earth, has been the site of some of the greatest miracles in the Bible. It was across the Jordan river in the "plains of Moab" that the children of Israel camped when Moses gave his farewell address, recorded in our Bibles as the book of Deuteronomy, and went up into the mountains of Moab, looked over the promise land, died and God buried his body. It was in this place that Joshua sent out the spies to Jericho and there they met Rahab the harlot and she saved them from certain death and secured her place among the celebrated women of the Bible. It was near this same place that the children of Israel crossed over Jordan into the land of promise, the land of their inheritance, and the walls of Jericho fell. It was this same place at Beth Arba that Jesus of Nazareth appeared walking toward His cousin John, the immerser (Baptize is a Greek word that mean immerse of dip) and was immersed in the muddy waters of the Jordan. It was the same area where the Lord Jesus was staying and ministering when He got word that his dear

friend, Lazarus, had died and He remained in the area until He climbed the steps and made his journey to Jerusalem just prior to the Passover week and ultimately, to His substitutionary death, burial, resurrection, and ascension.

Next, let's examine what happened with Elijah. Elijah was one of two men in the Bible, along with Enoch (ee-knock), who never tasted death (Genesis 5:22). The mode of transport for Enoch was taking a "walk with God." However, Elijah's exodus was much more dramatic. Elijah's departure was known and predicted by the mentees of both Elijah and Elisha. This training academy was known as the "Sons of the prophets," the prophets being Elijah and Elisha. They were men of God in training. God had notified them and so they were privileged to this great miracle. Elisha was the closest in spirit and proximity to Elijah and so his request to his mentor was, "Let a double portion of your spirit fall on me" (verse 9).

Prayer and Action Steps

Great God of Elijah, may the same Holy Spirit that dominated Elijah and Elisha dominate, consume, and control us every moment of our lives, and may we be a part of the generation that is taken to heaven without feeling the sting of death! Amen.
