HAGGAI 1

Haggai 1

The name "Haggai" means "Festive, a joyful occasion." His name is a name that arises from hope and the promise of a better tomorrow. Haggai is usually associated with another prophet who was a contemporary of his, Zechariah. The prophet's messages to the nation were given over a period of four months and called the nation to action. Haggai saw a rapid response and obedience to the words God had spoken through the prophet. It took only three weeks from the time that Haggai spoke the words of God until Zerubbabel, the governor, and Joshua, the high priest, along with all the people, took up the work of repentance and began the great work to rebuild the temple that had been destroyed sixty-six years earlier.

The background of the prophecy of Haggai is of utmost importance if we are to understand the storyline of this portion of the prophets. As Zephaniah, Jeremiah, Huldah, the prophetess, and others had predicted, the judgment of God had come upon the southern kingdom of the nation of Israel called Judah. In 605 B.C., the first phase of captivity and exile took place under the leadership of Nebuchadnezzar. This first phase included the taking away and exiling of Daniel, Hananiah,

Mishael, and Azariah. A puppet king had been set up, but that did not last long. The Babylonians returned in 597 B.C. and took everyone else in Judah captive.

Nebuchadnezzar left only the poorest of the poor and rejected of the day to tend and keep the land. In a final blow to the land after the rebellion of those left behind, the Babylonians returned to Judah and Jerusalem and destroyed the beautiful temple built by King Solomon. Israel had been without a central worship center for almost 70 years, the time prophesied by the prophet Jeremiah for the people to be in exile.

Haggai called the people to repentance, to action, to obedience, and commitment to the task placed before them. In chapter one, Haggai instructed the people to "Consider their ways!" and to understand that they had not finished their assigned task. They had started well but had not finished well. They needed to get on with the work!

Prayer and Action Steps

It is not enough to begin well. God wants all His children to finish well. Jesus finished the assignment from the Father. If we are to be like Jesus our LORD, we must finish well too.
